


Why study Pharmacy? And how has the journey been thus far?

Apart from academic lessons, what other programmes did you participate in? And how did the experience(s) benefit you in your (a) personal growth and development, and (b) academic pursuits?

In my 2nd year, I participated as a mentee in the INSPIRXE Mentorship Programme organised by NUS Pharmaceutical Society (NUSPS) Academic Committee and NUS Pharmacy Alumni Group. This 9-month programme connects Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Science students with NUS Pharmacy alumni that have both industry and clinical expertise via a group mentoring model. I was privileged to be attached to two mentors in different areas: Clinical Pharmacy and Industry Work. My mentors are passionate about pharmacy practice and they shared valuable first-hand advice for future practicing pharmacists that I would not have been able to learn in school.

What other interesting activities did you partake in to further enrich your student life, e.g. extra-curricular activities on campus?

I was a member of NUSPS 60th Pharmacy Profession Awareness Committee (PPAC) where I helped to facilitate various outreach events organised by the Department.
